Open to all age groups, must be made by entrant in last twelve months

Maximum size A4 size when mounted.
Put exhibitors name on the back of each entry
- 77 An Item of Knitting
- 78 An item hand crafted from natural materials
- 79 A Home Made Toy
- 80 Something New from Something Old
- 81 An Item of Crochet
- 82 A Painting or Drawing –any Medium
- 83 A Jar of Jam
- 84 An Item of Soft Furnishing
- 85 A Greeting Card—any medium
- 86 An Item of Embroidery or Tapestry
- 87 4 slices of tray bake—any variety (Maximum 4x2 inches)
- 88 A traditional Victoria Sponge
- 89 4 pieces of Shortbread
- 90 Any Cake showcasing vegetables e.g. carrot, parsnip, beetroot or courgette in an 8 inch round tin.

Advice on Presentation of Vegetable Entries

Beetroot, Parsnips and Carrots
The top leaves must be cut off
to make the remaining stalks
3 inches long (7.5 cm)



Rhubarb tops must be trimmed
down to the top of the stalk as
shown on the left hand in the
example opposite

The tops of the onions have to be
turned over and tied neatly to make
the exhibit look as tidy as possible



Fruit and Tomatoes can be
exhibited on the paper plates provided
to enhance the look of the exhibit

The above presentation makes the exhibit more pleasing to the
judge's eye which is what it is all about in search of that **RED** card
